

Manuscript organization

Manuscripts should be organized as follows:

<p>Beginning Section</p>	<p><i>The following elements are required, in order:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Title page: List title, authors, and affiliations on the first page of the manuscript <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Title (maximum of 150 characters, with spaces) ○ Authors' names (spelt out as they would be cited) * ○ Affiliations and email addresses * ○ ORCID numbers (optional) * • Abstract (maximum 200 words; background, objectives, materials and methods, results, discussion, conclusions. Do not include reference citations or undefined abbreviations) <p>Keywords (3 to 5. Do not use words from the title. Ensure all the keywords are in the manuscript body text. Use always the maximum possible number of keywords. Each keyword should not contain more than two words, and each keyword should start with an uppercase letter)</p> <p><i>* The anonymity of the work in the initial submission must be ensured. The information regarding the authors should only be included in the resubmission phase.</i></p>
<p>Middle Section</p>	<p><i>The following elements can be renamed as needed (2200 to 4000 words for Book Chapter; 1500 to 3200 for Proceedings Articles):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Introduction - The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight its importance. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance, including specific hypotheses being tested. The current state of the research field should be reviewed carefully, and key publications should be cited. Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. The introduction should contain the aim of the work. Keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists working outside the topic of the paper. • Materials and Methods - They should be described with sufficient detail to allow others to replicate and build on published results. New methods and protocols should be described in detail, while well-established methods can be briefly described and appropriately cited. Give the name and version of any software used (if applicable). • Results - Provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results and their interpretation. • Discussion - Authors should discuss the results and how they can be interpreted from previous studies and the working hypotheses. The findings and their implications should be addressed in the broadest context possible, and the limitations of the work should be highlighted. Future research directions may also be mentioned. This section may be combined with the Results. • Conclusions - This section answers the research objective in the light of the experimental conclusions.
<p>Ending Section</p>	<p><i>The following elements are required in order:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Acknowledgements or funding information (maximum of 350 characters, with spaces) • References (20 to 40, APA 7th Edition Style)
<p>Other information</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For Book Chapters, either British or American English can be used. PT or BR Portuguese are allowed in alternative to English for Proceedings Articles. The language must be consistent throughout the manuscript. • Figures and Tables are inserted immediately after the first paragraph in which the figure is cited. • Images and tables are limited to a maximum of 5 per manuscript. For each figure or table that fulfils half of a page, the maximum limit of words should be reduced in 200 words. For larger images or tables, 400 words must be reduced to the maximum word count.

Keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists working outside the topic of the paper. • Materials and Methods - They should be described with sufficient detail to allow others to replicate and build on published results. • Results - Provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results and their interpretation. • Discussion - Authors should discuss the results and how they can be interpreted from previous studies and the working hypotheses. The findings and their implications should be addressed in the broadest context possible, and the limitations of the work should be highlighted. Future research directions may also be mentioned. This section may be combined with the Results. • Conclusions - This section answers the research objective in the light of the experimental conclusions. • Keywords – Between 3 and 5

<p>Other information</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For Abstracts, either British or American English can be used. The language must be consistent throughout the manuscript. • Figures and Tables are not considered for this type of publication.
